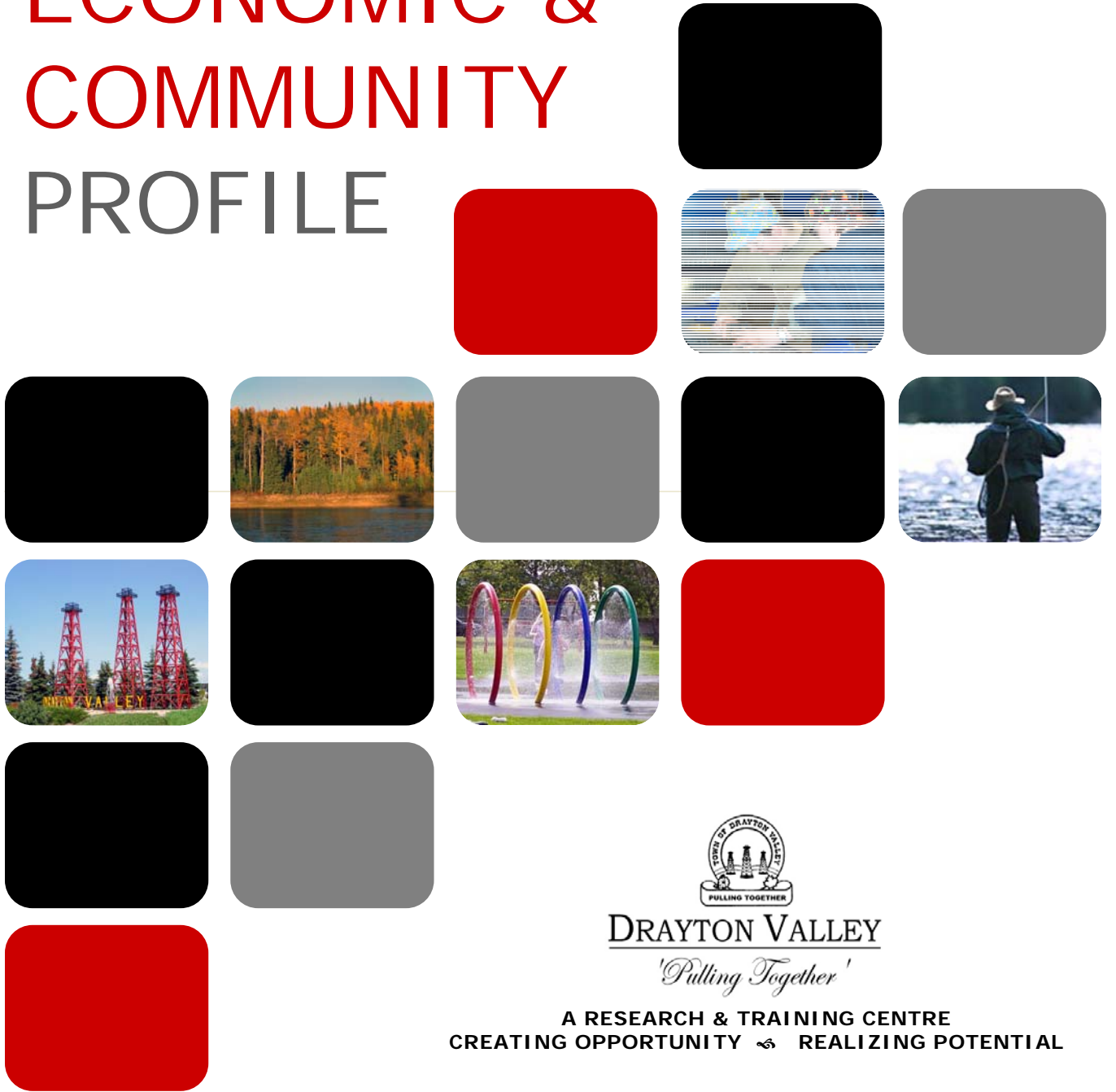

Welcome to Drayton Valley

Welcome and thank you for your interest in Drayton Valley, a thriving and prosperous community situated within Brazeau County and surrounded by untouched wilderness and beauty.

Drayton Valley is ideally positioned atop a plateau between the North Saskatchewan and Pembina Rivers where the rolling agricultural lands of the east meet the forested foothills of the west. It was incorporated February 1, 1957 and is the largest community within the County and is the focal point for all essential services catering to a trading area of approximately 20,000.

The economics of the Drayton Valley/Brazeau area started with lumber and the fur trade, progressing to mixed farming. In 1953 oil was discovered in the area and has become the primary economic base of the community. The Pembina Oilfield is Canada's largest and most prolific oilfield, encompassing more than 900 square miles. In 1987 Pelican Spruce Mills was completed and started production. The current owners are Weyerhaeuser Canada Ltd., they operate the local Sawmill.

The Municipal District is privileged in having large tracts of crown land within and adjacent to its boundaries, offering the outdoor enthusiast a wide range of activities. Three major water courses traverse through Brazeau County, the North Saskatchewan, Pembina and Brazeau Rivers, which provide their own individual recreation opportunities.

We are a progressive community and pride ourselves in being innovative as well as proactive. Many service industries based in Town have been leaders in their respective fields. The Town complements such economic activity by providing the necessary infrastructure to foster both business development as well as social and recreational activity. We create the opportunities so that you can realize your potential.

Located in west-central Alberta, nestled deep within in the North Saskatchewan River Basin and surrounded by forests of Aspen, Spruce and Pine lies the Town of Drayton Valley. The rolling hills and vast farm lands, that Alberta is known for, can be seen when traveling west on Highway 39 into Drayton Valley from the Edmonton International Airport. This leisurely country drive takes approximately 60 minutes and helps to illustrate much of our area's aesthetic qualities.

Drayton Valley is just 20 minutes south of Highway 16 and less than 60 minutes from Queen Elizabeth II Highway (formerly Provincial Highway 2). Drayton Valley is also situated only 139 kilometres from Edmonton.

Air Services

The Drayton Valley Airport serves both the recreational and business needs of the area. It is larger than most conventional rural airports. The Drayton Valley Airport is a 24 hour facility that has all-weather facilities and a 5,066 foot (including thresholds) runway that can accommodate every type of private aircraft including business jet traffic, up to a 737 and a Dash-8. The airport is 7 km from downtown Drayton Valley and is connected by a paved two lane roadway. It has a beacon guidance system and landing lights at the airport are radio activated and there is parking on the apron for planes. Refueling facilities exist for planes and helicopters. There is a medium terminal building with a lounge and there is parking for vehicles on site. An airport manager is available during normal business hours.



Property at the airport is available for development and the Town welcomes proposals from the business and private sector for any development at the airport. Development enquiries can be addressed to Chandra Dyck, Planning & Development Officer by calling the Town Office at 514-2200.

Drayton Valley is only 120 km from Edmonton International Airport, which will support the remainder of your freight and commercial needs.

Medical services in the area revolve around the Drayton Valley & District Health Centre. Opened in 1984, the facility is equipped with 50 Acute Care beds and 50 Long-Term Care beds, with medical services provided by a staff of 14 physicians. The hospital offers a full range of clinical services to the community and also offers a range of following specialized services. Emergency wait times at the hospital also prove to be shorter than those in larger population areas.

Services offered include: Dialysis Unit, Diabetes Education, Community Cancer Centre, Operating Room Services, Telehealth, Serenity House, Assisted Living/Supportive Housing, Seniors Wellness Program, Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Respiratory Therapy and Social Work.

The hospital also boasts a helipad used mostly by S.T.A.R.S. Air Ambulance. Travel time to the University of Alberta Hospital is only 17 minutes by S.T.A.R.S. Air Ambulance.

Waste Management

The Aspen Waste Management Facility is situated northwest of the Town of Drayton Valley in SE 1/4 20-49-07 W5M.

The landfill is closed on Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Years Day and Easter Sunday and open as follows:

The facility accepts cash only for Household refuse.

A Recycle Depot is located at the facility as well as two partial depots located at Dodson Plaza (behind Turbo), and Industrial Road (near Caesar's Inn).

Toxic Round-Up and Paint Exchange is accepted year round. Fall and Spring Clean-Up is carried out by the Town at no charge to residents. Watch for advertisements in the local paper for the above events.

Drayton Valley garbage collection is serviced by MCL, Tel. 542-5919. Contact them directly for collection days.

The Blue Bag Program in Drayton Valley is a new way to recycle old bottles, cans, plastic bags, and paper. Recyclables are collected every two weeks. Contact MCL directly for collection days, Tel. 542-5919.

Technology

Alberta has one of the highest concentrations (74% of households) of personal computers per capita in Canada¹. Alberta has the highest percentage (61%) of people connected to the Internet compared to any other province in Canada². Drayton Valley and area residents and businesses heavily rely on these services such as high speed or wireless internet. Over 65% of homes in Drayton Valley are connected to the internet³.

The future of economic growth in the Drayton Valley area centres on accessible technology and the potential for e-commerce or e-business opportunities. Infrastructure (availability of rapid data transfer – high speed internet) in the town addresses these developments.

Broadband service is available in town through, Shaw Cable and TELUS. These companies also provide broadband service to businesses that use e-commerce and home based businesses.

Economic Base

The primary economic base in the Drayton Valley area is oil and gas. Situated on the Pembina oil field, Canada's largest and most prolific oilfield, Drayton Valley has been a pioneering centre of the Province of Alberta's energy wealth. As a result, Drayton Valley is also home to many local oil-related supply and service firms.

Forestry is also a major industry in Drayton Valley, with Weyerhaeuser, the world's largest lumber company, operating both a sawmill and an OSB plant. The presence of Weyerhaeuser has led to many spin-off opportunities both in forestry operations and in servicing the forest industry. The two major forests nearby are-- Rocky-Clearwater and Whitecourt.

A major centre of the energy and forestry industries for decades, the area has been growing steadily, but the latest surge is the biggest yet. Continued advances in oil exploration, increased focus on the development of value added forestry and agriculture businesses combined with the tremendous growth in the environmental and tourism industries, have provided explosive opportunities for both investment and expansion.

Agriculture is also an important part of the local economy. The rich arable land has been a source of growth and employment. Most activities focus around the cattle industry and related support services, with cow/calf operations and custom grazing occupying a large portion of the efforts. Recently, there has been diversification into other areas such as horse production, game farming, exotic animals, dairy and oilseeds.

Drayton Valley also has a growing small business community. The strengths of Drayton Valley in retail, trade, service and manufacturing, supported by a resource base of oil, gas, lumber and agriculture, has provided the town with a very stable growth pattern over the years.

It is Drayton Valley's goal to establish itself as a centre of knowledge, learning and innovation as well as a centre for research and development related to energy, forestry and agriculture. Drayton Valley's strengths include a young population, an untapped resource base of tourism opportunities, value-added agricultural processing, value-added forestry products and enhanced oil and gas recovery.

Not only are businesses looking at the Drayton Valley area as a good place to set up shop, but people are looking at it as a good place to put down roots and enjoy a great lifestyle.

Key Industries



Energy

Production of oil and gas in the Pembina Oilfields began in the early 1950's with the discovery of oil located a few miles southwest of Violet Grove. Since then, over 8,000 wells have been drilled with 5,500 still in service today. Forty-five years later, over 300 wells continue to be drilled annually. Numerous oilfields exist such as Bigory, Brazeau, Carrot Creek, Crystal, CynPemb, Keystone, Peco, Pembina, Pigeon Lake and West Pembina. The Pembina Oilfield is Canada's largest and most prolific oilfield (more than 900 m²).

The pipeline system (owned by Pembina Pipeline) gathers production from all these fields and transports to Edmonton and also picks up oil volumes from the Niton field area to the northwest and from the Willesden Green field located approximately 65 km south of Drayton Valley. Condensate is gathered at several gas plants in the Drayton Valley vicinity.

Presently, about 13,500 m³ of crude oil per day and 3,000 m³ of condensate per day move through this pipeline system to the Edmonton terminals. More than 90 wells were drilled last year and 100+ wells are expected this year. The area has been steadily growing since the 1980's but the latest surge is the biggest yet.

Forestry

The Drayton Valley area, located within portions of two major forests (Rocky/Clearwater and Whitecourt), is home to a thriving and growing forest industry. The local Weyerhaeuser Mill is a major manufacturing plant that produces lumber. As the largest single employer in the area, the plant directly employs approximately 320 people with a similar number employed by logging and hauling contractors. The sawmill uses spruce, pine, and fir. This makes the harvesting operations much more efficient and less wasteful.

Wood wastes boosts the province's power grid by an extra 10.5 megawatts of electricity each year due to a partnership between Drayton Valley Power and Weyerhaeuser. Prior to the partnership, waste material and board used to be burned on the site. This results in a reduction of particulate emissions, nitrogen dioxide, carbon dioxide, and other volatile organic compounds.

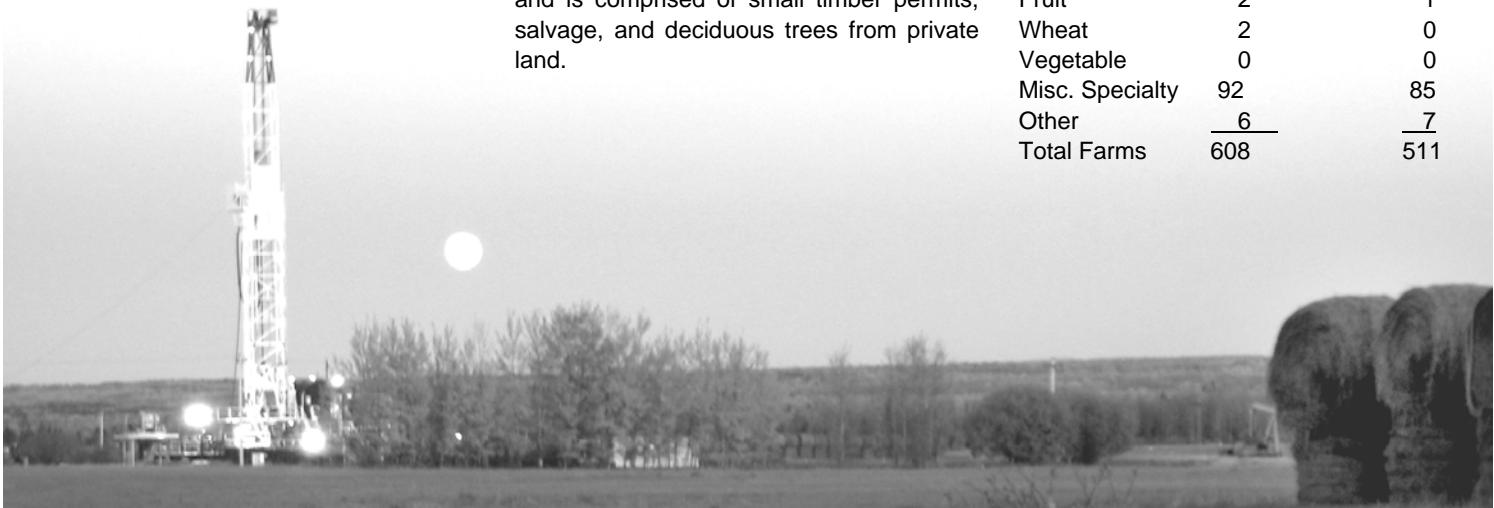
Although Weyerhaeuser dominates the Forestry industry in the area, opportunity exists for smaller sawmills. Tall Pine Timber Co. Ltd. began operating in 1968 and it was the first sawmill in the Rocky/Clearwater forest region to produce wood chips for sale to pulp producers. Unger's Sawmill was established in 1976 and is comprised of small timber permits, salvage, and deciduous trees from private land.

Agriculture

Presently there are over 500 farms in the region which are mostly mixed operations. Cow/calf operations make up most of the areas agricultural base. These farms have grain and forage production for their own requirements. Crop production ranges from pasture to oil seeds with major crops being of hay and oats. This area has some of the best forage and pasture producing land in the Province.

Agriculture development in the area is expanding with a trend towards larger commercial farms and land is in high demand. There are several game farm operations with exotic animals including elk, bison, wild boars, ostrich, llama, miniature donkey, white tail deer, yaks and exotic goats. Other operations farms include small-scale aquaculture operations in dugouts, small fruit and berry production, pork (farrow to finish), several small dairy farms and a multitude of small on farm businesses ranging from mechanical to fabrication.

Tourism

Tourism is rapidly becoming an important and fast growing industry in this area. Outdoor enthusiasts have always been frequent visitors to the area, enjoying the rivers, Brazeau Reservoir, and the vast amounts of neighbouring crown land. Spring and summer brings many golfers, campers, fishermen, bird watchers, and outdoor enthusiasts to the surrounding area. The Drayton Valley area is also well known for great hunting, quading and snowmobiling. The close proximity to Edmonton makes Drayton Valley and surrounding community a natural choice for get-a-ways and recreational activities.

The recreational tourist enjoys Drayton Valley's excellent sporting facilities. Drayton Valley hosts many events, including Provincial Curling, Baseball, Soccer, Snowmobile and Hockey tournaments. As well, numerous rodeos and agricultural events (indoor and outdoor) are hosted in Drayton Valley. The Arts community also has an annual event, "Art in the Park", that attracts many people.

Agri-Tourism has a growing presence in the Drayton Valley area and is becoming very popular. Agri-Tourism includes Farmers Markets and market gardens, fairs and rodeos, country vacations, farm visits and even chances to help out on a working ranch.

This area as well as the province is dealing with a fast growing industry. To help address this situation, the Town of Drayton Valley, Brazeau County, and the village of Breton have joined forces to operate the *Brazeau Regional Tourism Committee*, mandated to aid in the growth of the tourism industry (visit the website at www.brazeautourism.ca).

Environmental

Drayton Valley is home to a number of Environmental Companies. Due to the size of the oil & gas industry in the area, the majority of these companies specialize in oil related issues. These companies are making ground breaking strides in the Environmental industry in waste management and environmental clean-up and reclamation. Some of these businesses include Newalta Corporation Oil Separation Station and Labs and the Pembina Area Landfill (the only Class 1A Hazardous Waste Landfill sites in Alberta located 11 km northwest of Cynthia).

Drayton Valley is very proud to be the home of the Pembina Institute for Appropriate Development (PIAD), an organization that is recognized nationally and internationally for its participation in the Kyoto Conference on Greenhouse Gas Emissions. The objectives of PIAD recognize the escalating social economic and environmental problems are inextricably linked and that effective solutions will come by responding to the connections between these issues.

Training & Research

A fourth economic driver the Town of Drayton Valley is establishing the Town as a training and research centre. Drayton Valley's objective is to attract, keep, and bring training dollars into the community to enhance long-term sustainability. The Town actively works to attract and facilitate various seminars and workshops, connect existing educational institutions' training programs with local industry and groups, and create partnerships with existing national training organizations. The town is also striving to become first adopters of research opportunities and connect research opportunities with interested individuals/groups together to create research synergies.

As a developing sector, the Town is actively seeking partners in the field of training and research. If you have an identified opportunity, you are welcome to explore partnership with the Town.
