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COUNCIL DECISION ITEMS

UTILITY AMENDING BYLAW 2020/11/E PRESENTED FOR SECOND AND THIRD READINGS

Administration is proposing to amend the current utility bylaw to include a clause in the Water Service Charges and Rates section and to include a Grease Traps section. Council gave First Reading to the Utility Amending Bylaw on July 15, 2020 and it was then advertised in the local newspaper for two weeks. Following the Public Hearing, the Utility Amending Bylaw 2020/11/E was presented for Second and Third Readings and Council made an amendment to the motion by moving forward with the Grease Traps section, and tabling section 3.4.14 (c) the Water Service Charges and Rates section to a later date.

SUBDIVISION APPLICATION DV/20/01 WITHIN NE ¼ 22-49-7-W5M

Administration at West Central Planning Agency (WCPA) received an application to subdivide a 10 acre/4.05 hectare parcel from the remainder of NE ¼ 22-44-7-W5M for residential purposes. The subject lands are bordered by Range Road 72 to the east and Township Road 494 to the north. Council approved proposed Subdivision DV/20/01 subject to the following conditions:

- The Developer is to engage an Alberta Land Surveyor to prepare a plan of subdivision in accordance with the Town's block numbering system for registration at the Alberta Land Titles Office.
- That a separate rural 911 address is created for Proposed Lot 1 in accordance with applicable municipal addressing requirements.
- That the Applicant submits an endorsement fee of \$200 to the Town of Drayton Valley at the time the Plan is submitted for endorsement.
- Municipal Reserve (MR) is owing and is to be deferred into the remainder of the quarter section. The Town of Drayton Valley will prepare the necessary documents for registration on title for the remainder of the quarter section.

COUNCIL DECISION ITEMS

APPOINTMENT OF ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER

In July 2020 an RFP process was undertaken to receive proposals for contracted Animal Control services for the Town, however no submissions were received. A resume was submitted to apply for employment with the Town of Drayton Valley to provide this service and Administration hired an Animal Control Officer on July 27, 2020. In order to enforce Animal Control Bylaws and apply fines, Council approval is required and Council approved the appointment of Meghan Kennedy as Animal Control Officer for the Town of Drayton Valley.

LETTER TO SUPPORT NATIONAL CHILDCARE FRAMEWORK

As an Advisory Board of the Town of Drayton Valley, the Childcare Operating Board has been an active participant in advancing quality childcare for our community. On July 3, 2020, The Childcare Operating Board passed a resolution recommending that Town Council advocate for Universal Childcare across Canada. A letter was written to the Minister of Families, Children and Social Development and presented to Council for its support and Council approved the letter advocating for universal childcare across Canada.

SETTING EMISSIONS REDUCTION TARGET UNDER THE PARTNERS FOR CLIMATE PROTECTION PROGRAM (PCP) MILESTONES FRAMEWORK

With Council Resolution #217/15, the Town of Drayton Valley joined the Federation of Canadian Municipalities Partners for Climate Protection Program. This program helps municipalities reduce energy use and emissions through a five-step Milestone Framework. Milestone 1 was successfully achieved on January 27, 2020 and Administration is now in the process of completing Milestone 2; suggestions for the corporate and community emissions reduction target for Council's consideration include reducing corporate emissions by 8% below 2015 levels by 2030 and reduce community-wide emissions by 6% below 2015 levels by 2020. These targets reflect quantifiable savings that can be achieved and Council adopted the emission reduction targets as presented.
